

## Savanna Well Servicing Work Wear Checklist

<b>Duffle Bag</b> To transport and store clothing, water resistant. Medium to large size - some people also use hockey bags.	

## PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT (PPE)



The following is intended to be used as a guideline for you, so you can be prepared before you go out to the field. All PPE must be CSA approved, properly fitted, maintained and chosen appropriately for the task at hand.

**Savanna Well Servicing (“Savanna”) will provide you with the following PPE:**

- a CSA approved hard hat
- Fire retardant coveralls and
- Safety glasses
- Hearing Protection (Ear Plugs)

At the worksite there will be more specific types of PPE provided for you when required.

Items **not** provided by Savanna that you are required to have to work safely and comfortably are outlined in the following:



### CSA Approved Steel Toed Work Boots

- Must have the green CSA triangle on them.
- High cut boots must be used for ankle support.
- Defective boots may not be worn (exposed toe, tears, missing tread, etc.)
- Always wear and maintain your boots according to the manufacturer’s Instructions.

Other footwear to consider having during different seasons would be rubber and insulated boots.



## WINTER GEAR REQUIREMENTS



### Winter Gear

- Must have suitable winter work clothing for the existing conditions and the work being performed.
- Must fit well and be comfortable.
- Outer layers must be fire retardant and have high visibility.
- All other layers must consist of natural materials and be anti-static.
- Always maintain your winter gear according to manufacturer's instructions.
- Long underwear, bama socks, salt and pepper glove liners and neck warmers are good ways to keep your body insulated.



## TIPS FOR STAYING WARM DURING WINTER

Staying warm in the winter is achieved by dressing in multiple layers, keeping dry and minimizing exposed skin. Remember that you may be creating body heat as you work so extra layers are important to be able to change clothes during breaks to keep dry. This is especially important with your hands, wear multiple layers (e.g. using cotton gloves, etc.) and keep your hands dry.

### CLOTHING TIPS

- ✓ Always have at least one set of extra clothes to change into if your current work wear gets contaminated.
- ✓ Clothing worn at the rig will not be worn to and from the rig. Clothing worn to and from work need to be clean and season appropriate (e.g. winter jacket and boots in the winter).
- ✓ All rig employees must wash or discard clothing which has been contaminated in oil or hazardous chemical. Clothing shall not be washed in inflammable liquids.

### TYPES OF CLOTHING NOT PERMITTED ON THE RIG

- ✗ Savanna does not permit wearing any hooded layers and recommends not wearing bulky head wear between your head and the suspension of your hard hat, which may prevent your hard hat from working properly.
- ✗ Scarves are also not allowed as they create a high risk of entanglement.
- ✗ Rig employees and supervisors will not wear clothing made of nylon or other static electricity producing fabrics at the work site.

*If you have any questions about what type of clothing or PPE to be wearing on the work site, ask your rig manager or call your local field office.*

## HAND PROTECTION REQUIREMENTS



### Hand Protection for Job Hazards

- Must fit well and be comfortable.
- Must protect against chemicals, scrapes and abrasions, heat and cold, punctures and electrical shock.
- Defective gloves may not be worn (oil saturated, torn, holes etc).
- Always wear and maintain your gloves according to the manufacturer's instructions.



## TIPS FOR PROPER HAND PROTECTION

- The majority of service rig workers wear either washable cotton gloves referred to as green kings or leather gloves (insulated or non-insulated).
- There are a variety of brands and several colors to choose from but always choose high visibility when possible.
- There are several other styles of gloves you could consider wearing including but not limited to impact resistant and rubber.
- Depending on the type of work and/or weather conditions it may be conceivable to go through a few pair of gloves a day.



## RAIN GEAR REQUIREMENTS



### Rain Gear

- Required for wet weather, tripping wet pipe or working with chemical.
- Must fit well and be comfortable.
- Must protect against water and chemical.
- Must be fire retardant and have high visibility.
- Always wear and maintain your rain gear according to the manufacturer's instructions.
